The Slow Days of Summer by Chris O'Connell

Summer is the slow season for birding. Many birds go to ground and quietly raise their young, performing their primary duty. Migration is minimal. The days are hot. But nonetheless, interesting things are always happening.

Junco juveniles abound, tricking novices with their funky appearance. Chickadee chicks squeak and flit, bouncing around in small and ubiquitous family units. And the unusual is always possible, if not expected. Elegant Terns were recently discovered at the National Wildlife Refuge in Menlo Park, breeding in the shadows of the Dumbarton Bridge. Peter Metropolus reports this as not only the first nesting record of the county but also a first for Northern California! While the inclination is to celebrate this, it also reflects a changing climate, blunting the warm, fuzzy feelings. Black Oystercatchers are also nesting at this site, which is an extreme rarity for the bayside.

In early June, Kent Forward found evidence of Say's Phoebes breeding along Higgins Canyon Road in Half Moon Bay. Peter Metropolus confirmed this as the first breeding record in the county. You just never know what you might find, but you will never find it if you don't look.

Sequoia Audubon does not have Board of Directors meetings in July or August. We don't have our monthly membership meetings either. It's the slow season. Field trips become a bit scarce. This newsletter is only 4 pages long. But nonetheless, interesting things are always happening.

We have our day-long Summer Planning meeting in August, brainstorming on ideas for the coming year. We have our Volunteer Appreciation Lunch at Cameron's Inn in Half Moon Bay in June. And we have a new Field Trip Coordinator! Casey Girard has gamely stepped up to replace Adam Dudley, who has moved out of the area (see page 2 for details). And finally, our Youth Scholarships have been awarded.

Originally, we planned to give out 2 youth scholarships to the American Bird Association's Camp Colorado, but one thing led to another and we ended up with 4 deserving recipients. After assessing the applications, the Scholarship Committee recommended the following young naturalists: Aeon Lem, 15, of Belmont, Abbigail Nix, 16, of San Mateo, and the brothers Cedrik von Briel, 15, and Dominik von Briel, 13, of Redwood City. They will attend the camp in August and we are confident they will have a great experience in Colorado.

Sequoia Audubon has raised enough money to ensure this scholarship will continue next year. We hope to make it a long-term, annual program and encourage donations earmarked for this cause.

Birding Wine Regions of the World - California, Chile, South Africa and Beyond

Speaker: Alvaro Jamarillo

Join us for a fun talk about how climate affects the environment, as well as the birding! The climate type is the Mediterranean zone with dry summers and wet winters – sound familiar? We live in a Mediterranean-type climate, and this happens to be the type of region where people produce the finest wines. But similar climates don't always have similar avifaunae. In some cases, there are clear-cut differences, while in other situations we have very different birds that fit a similar niche in separate Mediterranean parts of the world. Come see a view of what makes Mediterranean regions tick, the great birding to be enjoyed, and maybe we will even talk a bit about the wine!



Alvaro Jaramillo runs Alvaro's Adventures, offering local pelagic day trips as well as tours of Japan, Cuba, South Africa and more. He is a world-renown ornithologist, author, and tour leader

who also happens to be a regular guy residing in our beautiful county. He also serves as the Senior Outreach Biologist for the San Francisco Bay Bird Observatory.

Last year, a rare Black Vulture was spotted spending time with Turkey Vultures and a seal carcass at Año Nuevo State Park. Many local birders flocked to the site over the ensuing couple of weeks. One day, Alvaro was 5 miles north at Gazos Creek State Beach observing the gull flock when the Black Vulture soared over his head. This led Aaron Maizlish to cogently observe, "He doesn't chase rarities, the rarities chase him. He is... the most interesting birder in the world."

Other Events: Pescadero Marsh Guided Walks

Pescadero State Beach and Pescadero Marsh Natural Preserve comprise a rich ecosystem with many birding opportunities. The Coastside State Parks Association is a nonprofit group that, among other things, trains docents to lead walks at the marsh there. The paragraph below is taken from their website and provides some details.

One or more docents and volunteers lead guided walks from the central parking lot onto the beach and into the Marsh twice a month on the first Sunday at 10 a.m. and the third Sunday at 1:00 p.m... Docents emphasize stewardship as vital in the Natural Preserve: to stay on the trails, view animals quietly at a distance, not to collect plants or seeds and not to leave litter behind. Docents also plan and lead special walks as requested by the Volunteer Coordinator for school groups, college classes and community organizations. Volunteers at the Marsh may also help with bird, fish and water-level monitoring projects and trail maintenance.





Don Edwards NWR Ravenswood Salt Pond SF2

Saturday, July 20, 8:00 am - 11:00 am

We will meet at the end of the parking near the gated entrance to the salt pond. Caspian Terns, Forster's Terns, Black Skimmers and now Elegant Terns nest here! We will check out the breeding colony as well as look for shorebirds, raptors, gulls, and American White Pelicans. **Directions:** Drive down east 84 towards the Dumbarton Bridge. Take the last exit before you head over the bridge, parking is on your left. Heavy rain or Air Quality Index over 100 cancels. Leader: Casey Girard. Contact: casey.girard@gmail.com.

Burleigh Murray Ranch State Park Sunday, July 21, 8:00 am - Noon

Join us for a leisurely 3-4 hour walk in this bird-rich gem on our coast. The trail is a one-mile former ranch road leading to a historic barn. Plan layers for cool temps, morning fog and sunshine. *Heavy rain cancels.* Directions: We will meet at the lower parking lot to the Johnston House, located on Higgins Canyon Road in Half Moon Bay. Higgins-Canyon Rd. begins just off of Hwy 1, going east where Main Street ends. The Johnston House is the big white 1850s farmhouse on the hill. Pillar Point Harbor

Saturday, August 17, 8:00 am - 11:00 am

Pillar Point is a hot spot for birding year-round. We should find a variety of resident birds and hopefully, some migrating shorebirds. Most of the walking will be on fairly level dirt trails, but if time permits, we may hike up onto the bluff top for a better view out to sea. Scopes will be useful here, so if you have one, bring it along. A primitive restroom is available at the parking lot. **Directions:** The harbor is located just west of Coast Hwy One, 4 miles north of Half Moon Bay. From Hwy One, turn west at the stoplight at Capistrano Rd. and continue along the north side of the harbor to Prospect Way. Turn left onto Prospect, then a brief jog right on Broadway, to an immediate left on Harvard Ave. Proceed through the boatyards to the end of Harvard Ave., then turn right onto West Point Ave. Meet at the "West Shoreline Access" parking lot, popularly known as the parking lot to Mayericks, just below the radar station.
