PALO ALTO NATURE TRAIL

October 19

Many interesting birds were observed here, a total of 64 species. The most outstanding were nine White-tailed Kites, an American Bittern, a Clapper Rail, and a Blue-winged Teal. Eighteen people attended, enjoying exceptionally good weather.

COASTAL AREA, PESCADERO SOUTH

November 2

Fourteen intrepid souls braved the wind and rain to observe over 30 species of birds - mostly shore birds. A large number of Surf Birds clung to the leeward side of the rocks at Pebble Beach - an invisible Wandering Tattler in plain sight - a flock of Audubon Warblers trying to keep out of the wind by staying below the cliff face. Two Kingfishers flying out over the rough surf. Even a California Murre was safely hidden in a protected spot.
