THE SEA OF CORTEZ

Ted Chandik, the well-known chief naturalist at the Palo Alto Baylands will share his experiences in the wildliferich Sea of Cortez with emphasis on the islands in the Gulf of California.

This shallow sea separating Baja California from the rest of Mexico is surrounded on three sides by some of the most inhospitable deserts in North America yet it teems with marine life and is one of the great bird nesting sites of the world. Isla Raza, for example is the nesting site of 99% of the world's Heermann's gulls as well as 45,000 elegant terns.

Boobies, red-billed tropicbirds, magnificent frigatebirds and other exotic ecies will fill the projection screen the accompaniment of Ted's lively, personalized and always interesting narration.

FROM THE EDITOR THE THIRD ANNUAL WILD GOOSE CHASE

Two years ago, I thought it might be a good idea if SAS got itself a computer. I had been doing the NEEDLES on borrowed computers for most of the 1984 year and, faced with the reality of having to return Rick Baird's machine to its rightful owner, couldn't bear to go back to using my battered old electric typewriter. However, I knew that neither SAS's or my budget could handle the expenditure necessary at the time. After making some fruitless attempts to have one donated, I decided that we would need to "do it ourselves". Since the Birdathon concept was already in use by National Audubon and PRBO, I thought it was a fundraising activity that would be readily acceptable — and — to distinguish it from other Birdathons — decided to call it the Wild Goose Chase.

Thanks to your support and to the support of many non-member friends of Audubon it has succeeded beyond my expectations. In fact, it has perhaps succeeded too well. Where before it was a non-budget item and could be used for "luxuries", it has now been incorporated into our budget and we now rely on this income to support our day-to-day operations and conservation activities. This was an unfortunate but requisite move necessitated by the reduction in our interest income and in our share of the dues from National.

This year's official team will be our five "regulars" - Linda Kypta, Peter Metropulos, Cliff Richer, Barry Sauppe and Gil West. However, should you wish to form your own team and sign up your own pledges - welcome to the game! Feel free to make up your own rules - it's not a contest - but just a way to raise some needed funds and have some fun at the same time. Our rules are simple. All birds must be identified within the 24 hour period beginning at 12:01 A.M. on Thursday, November 20 and all identifications must be positive -- no "could have beens" or "scaup species" allowed.

So once again, we are asking for your support. Our most pressing need at the moment is for a "boiler room". We were fortunate for the last Wild Goose Chase to have the use of a private firm's offices and its telephones for three hours on one evening. This particular office is no longer available to us and we need either a replacement office or individuals who will volunteer to call five or ten of their fellow members to solicit donations. Of course, we are also asking for your support in the matter of donations. NOV 8 FIELD TRIP TO THE PALO ALTO BAYLANDS. The Baylands SATURDAY is one of the few remaining and best preserved of the once numerous bay salt marshes and is the home of the endangered black rail and California clapper rail. It is also the winter home of many species of waterfowl, prime feeding grounds for five species of heron and a stopover for migrating birds. Many rare birds have been reported from this area during the fall and winter months and our last two trips yielded cattle egrets, a least bittern, swamp and sharp-tailed sparrows. Join us and see what we come up with this time. We will meet at the farther end of the duck pond at 9:00 AM. To get there take Hwy 101 south to the Embarcadero exit. Follow the Embarcadero east to its end and take a left. The duck pond is a short way up on the left opposite the Sea Scout and Yacht Club buildings.

A luncheon was held in October to honor Alice Kent, who for twelve years gave extensively of her time and talent to the ranch as well as supporting it financially. The event awas attended by close friends and associates from ACR.

Her contributions during the early years of the Preserve can hardly be overstated. At a time when Bolinas Lagoon was in danger of extensive development she donated the twelve and one-half acres of Kent Island above high tide which was key to thwarting plans for a marina.

The Ranch's well known posters of the great egret and great blue heron are Mrs. Kent's gift. She underwrote the cost of the three color separation plates and other production expenses for a portfolio of eight ACR birds from photographs by Clerin Zumwalt.

She was also instrumental in raising funds for the three tiered drinking fountain honoring the work of Stan Picher in Picher Canyon and planning trails and the picnic area.

The new docent classes at both the Bolinas Lagoon and Bouverie Audubon Preserves are underway with 40 students enrolled in Marin and 30 in Sonoma. This new crop of naturalists will begin leading school tours in the spring.





A RARE AND TRAGIC VISITOR

LINDA KYPTA

A Chuck-Will's-Widow decided to pass through our county this month but due to an unknown mishap and the kindness of a Half Moon Bay citizen, ended up at the Peninsula Humane Society Wildlife Rescue.

Wildlife Supervisor Sandi Stadler, Nick Coiro and I identified the bird by using the "process of elimination" method but it was not until Steve Bailey of the Academy of Science put his stamp of approval on it that we felt confident of an absolute identification.

The number of people genuinely concerned for the bird's welfare was amazing and plans were underway to have it flown back (by commercial jet) to its home in the Southeast.

This is the first record of this bird west of Texas. It's too bad we couldn't count it on our bird sighting lists; but sadder still was its death from unknown causes two days later.

(A day later, another southeastern visitor, a purple gallinule, was found in Fremont and at last reports was still well and free. I think this shows were missing a LOT of birds out there and goes a long way towards proving the theory that eventually all North American birds will pass through California.)


