Hawk Migration Allen Fish

Allen Fish, coordinator of the Golden Gate Raptor Observatory, will give our September program. He will present a slide program on "The Mysteries and Ecology of Golden Gate Raptor Migration."

Mr. Fish, a San Mateo County native, has a deep interest in raptors, and has been involved in raptor rehabilitation, banding, research, and conservation. His job as raptor coordinator has allowed him to be involved with raptors and also to encourage the public to become aware of our raptors. He will discuss some ecological aspects of hawk migrations. In particular, he will tell us about migration in the San Francisco Bay Area, as noted by the numerous volunteer 'hawk watchers' who work with the observatory at the Marin headlands and elsewhere in the Bay Area.

Come and hear about and see pictures of these magnificent birds, currently migrating through our area. Hear why and how to get involved in observing raptors and raptor behavior in the Bay Area. You'll also find excerpts from the GGRO's excellent *Raptor Report* in this month's and subsequent *NEEDLES*.

In our summer meetings your Board concentrated on five areas identified as top priorities during our spring Pigeon Point retreat.

CONSERVATION has an active committee headed by Bob Wilkinson. They will be concentrating on the Endangered Species Act, as well as bringing other conservation issues to our attention as they arise.

MEMBERSHIP: A group is only as strong as its members. We will contact lapsed members and welcome new members. "Member Friendly" is our slogan.

EDUCATION Chairperson Robin Smith is working on a possible grant to provide Audubon Adventures to more classrooms. The committee is also investigating the feasibility of sponsoring Environmental Workshops for teachers and distributing endangered species information to classrooms.

BIRDING: Judy Spitler has held her Field Trip Meeting and the new field trip schedule can be found on Page Two. We hope to hold "expert" workshops and seminars on specific bird groups. We'd like to hear from you on the possibility of scheduling these at 7:30 just before the monthly meeting. The Annual Wild Goose Chase, the Christmas Counts and the Birdathon will continue. We hope to re-activate the monthly "Bird Observations" column and the Field Trip Reports.

FUNDRAISING: Mary Bressler is masterminding three bird seed sales this year, the first in October. We are adding tide tables to the list of items on sale at the office. Clothing should be layered since the weather on Pt. Reyes is extremely changeable. Fall is normally the most pleasant time of year on Point Reyes but remember that it has the coolest average summer temperature in the continental US. We will meet at the Point Reyes National Seashore Headquarters building at 9:00 AM. The trip will take place rain or shine. Bring lunch. The trip normally lasts until 2 PM. News From Your Ranch

LAST SEASON AT THE BOLINAS LAGOON PRESERVE: Another great season has

ended at our Bolinas Lagoon Preserve. Our most important visitors, of course, were the herons and egrets. Nine great blue heron pairs, 94 great egret couples and a single snowy egret nest composed the heronry this year. The parking lot was visited each night of the season by a gray fox and a bobcat, each of which left its mark in what seemed an unending and messy territorial dispute. Red-winged blackbirds, cliff swallows and bandtailed pigeons were among our more obvious visitors. The blackbirds and pigeons will probably stay throughout the year, but the swallows will join millions of others in Central and South America.

On the people side, our visitors included 3,289 students from 131 classes. Of these, 60 classes were granted transportation scholarships by Bank of America so they could afford to get to the Ranch.

Visitors aren't the only story at the Bolinas Preserve. Our native grassland restoration project continues its successful projects. Volunteer Tony Paz and Ranch biologist Ray Petersen have prepared educational material on local ticks. Their research has led them to a possible connection between wood rats and Lyme disease, a line that will be pursued during the coming year.

CYPRESS GROVE COMES INTO ITS OWN: ACR was granted controlling interest in the Cypress Grove Preserve by our benefactor Clifford Conly at our August Board of Directors meeting held at the preserve. Clifford's house, which will one day serve as a conference center has been named in his honor. If you know anything of Cypress Grove or Tomales Bay, you know the importance of this gift. Because of it, ACR has moved to purchase and protect other properties along the shore of the bay. Without ACR it is doubtful that this critical estuary would be preserved and its environmental quality monitored as it is now. Our thanks go out to Clifford for his very generous and significant gift.

RESEARCH AT CYPRESS GROVE: The Preserve is home to much of ACR's research. John Kelly directs and consults on many projects ranging from native prairie restoration to aquaculture monitoring. We assess populations of migrating shorebirds, wintering waterfowl and nesting heron and egret colonies. We work to protect endangered plants and to monitor human impacts on harbor seals. The population of shorebirds dropped at the south end of Tomales Bay last December, and in mid-February there was a dramatic crash in their population. Bolinas Lagoon's small sandpipers disappeared too. The complete shift of shorebird population away from Tomales and Bolinas was unprecedented. We need to learn why this happened and its implications.

Mary Ellen King and her volunteers monitored harbor seal population, pupping success and incidents of human disturbance in north Tomales Bay. The population has dropped 90% since the mid-80s. They are being impacted by clammers, boaters and kayakers. On one day, 1225 clammers were on the sand bars north of the island in a 3 hour period.

The TRI-COLORED BLACKBIRDS RETURN: Biologist John Kelly noted the return of "trikes" to the Livermore Marsh at Cypress Grove on May 27. They didn't nest here last year and John is researching the theory that wind patterns influence their decisions on site choice.

The Endangered Species Act

In September, 1992, the Endangered Species Act (ESA) comes up for renewal. National Audubon has a priority campaign to assure reenactment of the ESA and to strengthen its provisions. We expect a tough fight, and want to alert you to the issues.

In 1973, Congress enacted the ESA to conserve endangered and threatened species and the ecosystems on which they depend. It is considered to be one of the most important environmental laws ever enacted by any nation. There are currently over 600 U.S. species on the official endangered species list. The ESA prohibits actions that would harm or kill a listed species. Federal agencies are required to ensure that their actions will not jeopardize the continued existence of a listed species or adversely destroy or modify its habitat.

National Audubon supports the passage of Rep. Studd's bill, H.R. 4045, "The Endangered Species Act Amendments of 1992", which reauthorizes and strengthens the ESA. H.R. 4045 will maintain strong protection for endangered species provided by the ESA. In addition, it will improve the effectiveness of the ESA in conserving threatened and endangered species by:

- Working to Recover Species from the Brink. Although the ESA requires development of recovery plans for endangered species, nearly half of all listed species do not have approved recovery plans, despite a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service report that the populations of species with such plans are more likely to increase than are species without recovery plans. H.R. 4045 sets deadlines for the development and implementation of recovery plans.
- Planning for Ecosystems, not Just Single Species. A frequent criticism of the ESA, by environmentalists and the development community alike, is that it addresses problems on a single species basis, ignoring ecological connections among species in trouble and creating uncertainty among developers about additional measures that may be necessary to protect other species. To alleviate these concerns, streamline the recovery planning process, and to achieve the ESA's stated purpose of conserving ecosystems on which endangered species depend, H.R. 4045 directs that priority be given to the development of integrated multispecies recovery plans for maintaining and restoring ecological communities.
- Protecting the Forgotten Species. There is a backlog of more than 3,000 species awaiting listing decisions, including approximately 600 species FWS had determined should be listed, but for which the resources necessary to complete the listings are unavailable and which receive almost no protection under the ESA. To help protect these forgotten species and to provide greater certainty to the development community, the ESA Amendments of 1992 direct the development of multispecies recovery plans that include candidate species as well as listed species.
- Investing for Tomorrow's Biodiversity. The ESA has long suffered from inadequate appropriations to implement its provisions. The ESA Amendments of 1992 raise authorization levels to much-needed levels, by Fiscal Year 1997, of \$100 million for the Department of the Interior, \$20 million for the Department of Commerce, and \$4.3 million for the Department of Agriculture.

As Congress takes up the 1992 reauthorization of ESA, it is critical that supporters of species conservation and environmental protection take a strong stand in support of the ESA.

ACTION ITEMS

- 1. Write Congressman Lantos and thank him for cosponsoring H.R. 4045. Ask him to work for the defeat of three negative bills, H.R. 3092, 4058, and 5101.
- 2. Many people predict that the ESA legislation will be postponed until after the election. Be sure to vote for people with strong environmental positions.
- 3. Audubon's Richardson Bay Education Center is assembling a set of slides on California endangered species. If you have good slides to donate, please contact the office. (345-3724)
- 4. We are planning a public awareness event. If you would like to help, please contact Bob Wilkinson. (347-8367)
- 5. If you have an interest in speaking to groups about the Endangered Species Act, we have materials and can help organize the talks. Again, contact Bob Wilkinson. (347-8367)

Travels With Adam

Adam, an immature male red-tailed hawk, was radio-tagged on November 7, 1990 at the Marin headlands. For the next week the Golden Gate Raptor Observatory (GGRO) tracked Adam through seven counties as he searched for a winter residence.

For the first two days, Adam retreated somewhat from his migratory route and spent the time in Marin County, mostly in

Mill Valley. Even with the limited range (maximum 5 miles on a roosting bird) of the transmitters, the tracking teams were able to stay with Adam continuously on November 9 as he mustered up his courage and crossed the Golden Gate. By nightfall he was comfortably roosted in the hills above Crystal Springs Reservoir.

On the morning of the tenth, the teams detected Adam moving south but lost him by mid-morning. Crisscrossing the Santa Cruz Mountains for the rest of the day and the morning of the next day. the trackers were unable to relocate Adam until a little after noontime, when one of the teams picked up a signal near Santa Cruz. It took until 5 PM to find the bird roosting in suburban Scott's Valley.

The next morning Adam continued south, circling over the agricultural fields of Watsonville in the early afternoon, before once again losing the persistent trackers.

Early the next morning the trackers found him again near Aromas where he stayed for two days. On the 14th the researchers followed Adam almost continuously through the Salinas Valley to Chualar, where he roosted with two other red-tails. On the fifteenth he hunted the valley, finally roosting in Soledad. On the 15th, Adam reversed directions and began hunting to the north in the Valley.

The teams were unable to locate him after lunch or for the next several days although a faint signal was picked near Chualar on the 18th.

On the 20th Jim Mills found Adam hunting the eastern slopes of the Salinas Valley between Gonzales and Chualar.

The teams took the Thanksgiving holiday off and returned on the 29th to resume their research. They were unable to locate Adam. They tried again on December 7 and 20 without success. The pre-holiday beeps were the last signals from Adam.

Letter To The Editor

Just a note regarding capitalization of bird names. In the *Pacific Raptor Report*, we have made a habit of capping birds' common names, which I *would* classify as proper nouns. The scientific journal perspective, as I understand it, holds that, since *birds* have a common name that is agreed upon by a code of standards (the AOU Check-List), then birds may have their common names capped.. If bugs, turtles, marmots and gobies all had widely-accepted common names, they *too* could be elevated to proper noun status. The problem of course is one human's "mountain lion" is another human's "cougar"; one's "fennel", is another's "anise."

Granted, the headache for editors is where you are using non-avian animal names and plant names next to the up-to-code birds. It looks dumb to write, "Great Egrets, long-tailed weasels and red willow were abundant in the riparian zone -- home of the Wilson's Warbler." Headache of headaches.

I admit to a bias toward using caps in unusual situations just so the word stands up to be noticed (which in overkill could hurt you as well). So I sometimes cap Hawkwatchers, Earth, Coyote Brush, Piperine Swallowtail and the Marin Headlands. I guess I assume that Proper Names make knowing a name a little more powerful.

If someone knows something about a Scrub Jay, isn't it more impressive than if they simply know details about a scrub jay? I'm still thinking about it, but not too hard.

Even before I received this note I had already scheduled articles excerpted from Allen's Pacific Raptor Report. [Now, that's an informative newsletter!] The argument about the AOU Checklist is the first compelling and rational reason I've seen for capitalizing bird names as proper nouns. ---The Editor)

During the fourteen days of tracking Adam moved 108 miles south from the Marin Headlands banding station, covering hundreds of miles in the process. His longest known continuous flight was the thirty miles ending near Crystal Springs.

Early observations - not conclusions - were that Adam appeared to rise earlier when he was intent on migrating, that he generally settled down at just about sunset (one exception) and that eucalypti may be important to redtails as roost sites. It is not known whether he preferred to migrate along the ridges or by following valleys....or whether he settled into the Salinas Valley or continued to proceed south-..or was Adam a typical red-tail or a young mayerick?

The GGRO intends to continue this fascinating research again this year, so if you should encounter a vehicle full of electronically eared birders pointing their antennae to

various points of the compass, just wish them good luck and best regards from Adam.
