#### **Birding Bosque Del Apache**

Bosque Del Apache, New Mexico is one of the most picturesque wildlife refuges in the West. Imagine the sight of thousands of Snow Geese and Sandhill Cranes filling the sky above Cottonwoods and flooded fields with mirror-like surfaces. Mix in the excitement of coyotes charging into flocks of waterfowl feeding between cornrows. Add mountains and colorful sunrise/sunset skies and you have the right composition for unsurpassed wildlife and scenic photography.

## **Kern River Preserve Field Trip**

July 11-14, 2003

The Kern River Preserve is a hot spot in more ways than one. As the summer temperature rose to 108 degrees during the day, the 16 hearty Sequoia Audubon birders were high up in the cooler altitudes of the Southern Sierra Nevada. Some of the birds seen there were Calliope Hummingbirds at the Black Rock Ranger Station feeders and White-throated Swifts flying just over our heads atop Bald Mountain Lookout.

The preserve itself is a hot spot of bird activity. Although we only heard but didn't see the Yellow-billed Cuckoo, we got great looks at singing Blue Grosbeak, Western Kingbird and Common Yellowthroat (or Resplendent Yellowthroat as our host, Bob Barnes, would like to rename it). Two new birds for most of us were Le Conte's Thrasher and Lesser Nighthawk. All in all a great trip!

Visit one of the newer parts of the Don Edwards San Francisco Bay National Wildlife Refuge. Find out from leader Robin Smith which unique birds live here and why Bair Island is such an important conservation area. Easy walking on flat trails.

#### Birding At Filoli

#### Midweek Walk To Windy Hill

#### Año Nuevo State Reserve

Saturday, November 15, 8:00 AM

Año Nuevo is one of the most picturesque and ecologically rich areas along the central California coast. The reserve is about 4,000 acres of coast beaches, marshes, rolling dunes with costal scrub, grasslands and coastal mountain range. The reserve is famous for Elephant seals and sea lions that visit the beaches here. It is a great spot for wintertime birding. Along the shore we will look for sea and water birds such as loons, scoters, and lots of wading birds. We will look up in the sky for wintertime visiting hawks and raptors. And we will explore the reserve for resident, migrants, and possible visiting bird rarities.

**Directions:** Take Hwy 92 west to Hwy 1 in Half Moon Bay. Go across Hwy 1 at the light, and drive into the Safeway parking lot. We will meet to carpool at 8:00 AM sharp, at the southwest corner of the lot. Dress in layers for cold windy weather. Wear walking shoes and bring, fluids and snacks. Heavy rain cancels.

Docents at Bouverie and Bolinas Lagoon Preserves are starting their fall programs of teaching 3rd-5th graders in classrooms and on trails; a large cadre of researchers are digging into a rich offering of projects; and our committees and boards are launching new projects for the coming year.



# 2003 ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATOR AWARD
