LETTER FROM A NEW MEMBER

I am a new member of Sequoia Audubon Society. More accurately, I am a returning member. I was a member in the 1970's when I was in college majoring in botany with a desire to learn about other areas of the natural world around me. Being involved in college classes and activities, I never did attend any field trips or meetings, but I read the magazine. I loved the pictures and the wellwritten articles and couldn't abide throwing the magazine out. That is the reason I finally quit the AS. I couldn't throw out the magazines and I couldn't keep them forever as I lived that volatile college student life, moving every year.

I'd not been successful identifying birds in my backyard or in trees until the mid-1980's. Oh yes, I knew some common birds that my mother taught me to identify, but those little brown birds flying around my abodes were too small and too far away to ever identify. They wouldn't stand still like plants did. In 1986, I became a docent at Ano Nuevo State Beach. Through the docent training I learned about the resident shore birds. I was very pleased to find that I could identify these birds. The marbled godwits, the sanderlings, the avocets, the curlew, the ovster-catchers, as well as the swallows that inhabited the barn and the cliffs. I felt self-satisfied that I could identify so many new birds and talk about them with certitude to visitors.

Now, many years later and between jobs, I have again joined the Audubon Society. I have found the magazine articles this time around to be just as provocative and well written -- still with those wonderful pictures. I anticipate attending the field trips and learning which little brown bird is which as well as identifying, by their songs, which birds wake me during the spring dawns. I am glad to be back.

Birding at Filoli

Saturday, September 11, 8:30 AM — Noon

Filoli is the property of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. We have been invited for a morning of birding at this beautiful estate on the edge of the San Francisco watershed. The grounds of Filoli have formal gardens surrounded by large oaks and trails leading to riparian, redwood, and farm habitats. Over 96 species of birds have been found here. Reservations required because this trip is limited to 20 people maximum. (Sorry, no children under 14.) No food or picnicking is allowed, but all will be welcome after the walk to buy light food and beverages at the Café and to visit the gift shop.

whatever current location has the best birds. Get your field guides and binoculars ready. You must call Robin to solve this mystery and find out where, when, and how to reserve your spot.

Hawk Hill

Sunday, October 3, 9:00 AM

Join SAS member and veteran GGRO hawk watcher Leslie Flint for a day at Hawk Hill during the peak of raptor migration. Expect to see accipiters (Sharp-shined and Cooper's Hawks); falcons, (Kestrels, Merlins, and perhaps Peregrines); Buteos (Red-tailed, Red-shouldered, and maybe Broad-winged and Ferruginous Hawks), Turkey Vultures, and Northern Harriers. We will also look for migrants in the trees around the hill. Bring binoculars, lunch, and liquids. Dress in layers – it can be hot or freezing depending on the fog. Meet at the base of Hawk Hill at 9 AM or at the top if you arrive later. There will be a Hawk Talk at noon and banding demonstration (with a live hawk) given by the GGRO volunteers at 1:00 PM.

ABA Regional Conference, Reno and Northwest Nevada Sunday – Friday, September 12-17, 2004

Located on the Truckee River in northwestern Nevada, Reno is nestled against the 11,000-foot massif of the northern Sierra Nevada, or Snowy Range. It serves as a gateway to the vast expanse of the Great Basin. The Sierra Nevada, a westward-tilted block with east-facing escarpments, developed through erosion into a series of steep-walled canyons. From Lake Tahoe, the largest alpine lake in North America, the Truckee and Carson Rivers slowly descend several thousand feet, and enter the ancient Pleistocene Lake Lahontan. Little-studied or birded until recently, this area offers a surprising abundance of bird life within a 70- to 80-mile radius of Reno. We will sample the diverse array of habitats: the striking desert terminus of the Truckee River, Pyramid Lake; the Carson Lake wetlands; alpine areas on Mount Rose; and riparian, meadow, and marsh habitats around the city of Reno.

Bird Banding Courses

The Institute for Bird Populations (IBP), based in California, is a non-profit organization dedicated to fostering a global approach to the preservation of birds and their habitats. IBP coordinates a large-scale cooperative program called Monitoring Avian Productivity and Survivorship (MAPS) that consists of a network of almost 500 banding stations throughout the continental U.S. and Canada. A wide assortment of contributors operates these stations, including government agencies, nonprofits, educational institutions, independent banders, and IBP itself. Birds banded at MAPS stations provide critically-needed information on productivity and survivorship that can help identify the causes of long-term population declines. MAPS is endorsed by the National Biological Service and Partners in Flight and relies increasingly on the contribution of data from volunteer cooperators. The operation of a MAPS station requires a commitment of one morning (six hours) every ten days between May and August for a total of seven to ten mornings a year, all of which can be on weekends. 




